Curriculum: Father Muller Medical College, Mangalore is affiliated to Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences (RGUHS), Bangalore, and recognized by the Statutory Regulatory Authority (National Medical Commission/ Medical Council of India). The institution follows the curriculum laid down by NMC/ MCI as per the guidelines from the affiliated University. Teaching schedule: The teaching schedule is prepared taking into account the minimum number of hours for each subject as prescribed by the University. Classes are conducted as per the teaching schedule. Teaching-learning methods employed for delivery of the Curriculum In addition to the traditional method of teaching other methods like simulation-based learning, case-based learning, bed side teaching, integrated teaching, community teaching are also used. Bioethics class: Class on Bioethics was started in 2013 well before the inclusion of Bioethics in the revised MBBS curriculum by the MCI in 2018. Inter-institutional teaching: Post-graduate students are posted to specialized centers like National Institute of Mental Health and Neuro Sciences, Bangalore, Jayadeva Institute of Cardiovascular Sciences and Research, Bangalore, KIDWAI Institute of Oncology. Evaluation: Evaluation of the students for the achievement of course and subject-specific objectives is done by regular Internal assessments. Internal assessment methods include theory, practical/clinical tests, viva, and OSCE/OSPE. Teaching-learning activities are meticulously planned in order to achieve the objectives of the undergraduate and postgraduate curriculum. Dean, Head of departments, and Course coordinators are involved in the planning and implementation of teaching-learning programs.

Continuous Internal evaluation of the students in the institution: Under graduate students: Continuous assessment of the students is done by conducting regular internal assessment tests, both in theory and practical as per university norms. Students are allowed to interact with HOD or staff about their performance. In addition to the internal assessments, students are also assessed by short tests, assignments, viva voce, discussion during postings, practical record completion with certain percentage of marks assigned. Online MCQ test through www.kahoot.com is also used. Post-graduate residents:

Continuous assessment of post-graduate students is done by conducting regular (monthly or quarterly theory tests), clinical/ practical tests yearly, maintaining a log book with grading and yearly assessment by all staff of the department. In addition, clinical post-graduate residents are also assessed during the clinical rounds.

Institution strictly adheres to the academic calendar for conduct of all academic activities. Academic calendar consisting of theory classes, clinical posting and internal assessment for individual batch is prepared in the beginning of phase. Internal assessments are conducted as per the schedule. Clinical posting tests are conducted after the completion of postings in respective subjects/ departments. Portion for the internal assessment is communicated to the students well in advance.

Best Practice 1: Title: 'Family study' - module to teach the MBBS students the role of family and social values in the health of an individual. Objectives of the Practice: The objectives of 'Family Study' study is, a. To enable each student to understand that the family is the basic unit of the community b. To obtain the practical experience in the health promotion, specific protection, early diagnosis, prompt treatment, limitation of disability, rehabilitation and to act as a family physician and learn about general medical practice. c. To study and observe the environmental factors responsible having their bearing on health and diseases of the family. d. To study the Socio - economic factors

responsible for the disease in the family and vice versa. e. To study and observe the Psychological or emotional factors having their impact on the health and disease of the family. f. To learn the importance of observing the patient in his natural environment affected by multiplicity of factors and their importance in medical history sheets. g. To suggest improvements in the environmental factors within the easy reach of the family and to take part in the health education programme for the promotion of health and prevention of disease. h. To educate them about the medical facilities availability in rural areas. The Context: The Department of Community Medicine has been teaching the students of MBBS the role of family and social values in the health of an individual by adopting the concept of Family study. As per this, poor families are identified in the rural and urban field practice area of the department of community medicine. Special focus is given to families with vulnerable population like pregnant and lactating women, infants, under 5 children and geriatric population and also families with health issues like Diabetes and Hypertension. The Practice Based on the family folders maintained in the health centres, the medico-social workers identify families and visit them prior to the students visiting the families. The MBBS students studying in 2nd year, who are posted in the Dept of Community Medicine, are divided into groups of 2 or 3 and each student is assigned one family. It is emphasized that the students are friends and health advisors to the allotted families and will act as family Physician during the whole period of training. Medical services needed by the members of the families will be provided through the rural health training centre and various departments of the college, hospitals, clinic. The students in 2nd year visit the families on 5-6 consecutive days and assess the complete family details, vitals events in the family, their nutrition and health status. Based on the details collected, the students analyse the various determinants and issues in the family and also chalk out recommendations to be given to the family members in a subsequent visit. The students also serve as a liaison for the family members if they visit the hospital for any health issues. The students are also advised to keep in touch with the family telephonically to monitor the health aspects of the family. The community diagnosis is also done by the entire batch of students and this helps them in understanding the social determinants of health in the community. In the third year, the students have around 2 follow up visits to the family to check whether the recommendations given earlier are followed or not. Health checkup of the available members are also carried out. All the activities are monitored by the staff of Department of Community Medicine. 5. Evidence of Success 'Family study' - though a method of teaching, has benefits to students and the families (society). Benefits to the families: 1. All the aspects of health are assessed at the doorstep and practical recommendations are given to improve the determinants of health. 2. The families have a familiar face in the hospital if they need to visit the hospital for any health issues. 3. Basic medicines are provided free of cost through the UHTC Orr RHTC as per the advice of the staff. Benefits to the students: 1. They observe the determinants of health in the family and community. 2. Improving the communication skills of the students. 3. Promotes active learning and management of health as they need to assess, review and provide recommendations under the Supervision of Faculty Member. 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required a) Migration of the families from the field practice areas. b) Non-availability on some days due to festivals and function. Best Practice 2. Title of the Practice: Eco friendly Campus. Objectives of the practice: 1. To protect and preserve the environment. 2. To propagate the concept of eco friendly campus. The Context: Pollution has become a part of life in the urban areas. There is a need to attend to this. Because, an eco friendly environment not only maintains the ecosystem, it also promotes effective learning. It provides a supportive environment for learning. Along with the proper learning resources, it is also essential to provide a suitable environment for learning. Father Muller Medical College is located in the

coastal area and has the advantage of sufficient rain fall. In this context, institution has standard guidelines to make the campus eco friendly by maintaining existing trees and planting of new saplings, effluent treatment and recycling system, ban on tobacco products, ban on plastic use etc. The Practice: Vegetation in the campus: • Every year new saplings are planted in order to replace the dead plants/ trees. • Gardening department shoulders the responsibility of maintenance of plants/ trees. • Celebration of Vanamahotsava by planting new saplings. • Saplings are offered as token of appreciation to dignitaries of academic and non-academic activities/ functions organised. Alternate source of energy: • Renewable energy resources are used in the campus to promote energy conservation. • Solar water heating panels are used in the hostels. • Biogas unit is another resources which contribute to energy conservation in a smaller scale. Water recycling: • Institution has sewage treatment plant in which waste water is recycled and used for multi-purpose like gardening and in toilets. Water distribution system: • Institution has water distribution system for effective storage and distribution of water. • Water purification units are installed at multiple places to provide safe drinking water. Institution has the policy for regular check up of water quality and maintenance of purification units. Battery powered electric vehicle: • Battery powered electric vehicle is used for movement of staff, students, patient relatives etc inside the campus. Restricted entry for vehicles: • Institution has the policy restricting the entry for vehicles inside the campus. • Students are not permitted to bring vehicles to the college. An undertaking is taken from the parents and student at the time of admission. Biomedical Waste disposal: • Policy for Biomedical waste disposal has been implemented in accordance with Karnataka Biomedical Waste Management Rules and NABH guidelines. • Colour coded segregation of biomedical waste is done and it is collected from collection area of the hospital by the certified handler RAMKY (Common waste management facility approved by The Karnataka Pollution Board) twice a day and transported in a covered vehicle to the waste treatment facility of RAMKY. Hazardous chemicals and radioactive waste management: • Hazardous chemical and radioactive wastes are managed as per Karnataka Biomedical Waste Management Rules and NABH guidelines. Such wastes are handed over to the certified handler RAMKEY with whom the institution has MoU. Rain water harvesting system and Open well recharge: • Water conservation is promoted through rain harvesting system and open well recharge. Wet waste management system: • Instituion has facility for wet waste generated in the campus. Plastic free Tobacco free campus: • Cloth bags and paper bags are made available in rehabilitation centre. • Medicines are dispensed by the Pharmacy in cloth bags. • Use of tobacco in any form is prohibited. Evidence of Success: The green campus initiatives of the institution have helped to keep the campus green and beautiful. Institution is able to save money on electricity bills due above initiatives. Ban on plastic items has made the campus clean. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: Since the institution is located in the coastal area with adequate rain fall and no issues of water shortage during summer, no particular issues are faced in maintaining vegetations. Rarely, the problem of water shortage is encountered which has been taken care with less difficulty. Notes: The institution has displayed boards regarding plastic ban, tobacco ban etc inside the campus at key places to create awareness about ecofriendly campus. Uses of non-plastic materials are encouraged. Less paper communication is practiced and the circulars are sent through emails.

The Management, Staff and Students of Father Muller Medical College, have been inspired and guided by the motto HEAL AND COMFORT instilled by its founder Father Augustus Muller. As a unit of Father Muller Charitable Institutions, the Medical college believes and practices its philosophy and objectives. The staff and students of the Medical college maintain the tradition of holistic approach to patient care. Mental Health: Psychiatry as a division of medicine in the general hospital of the Father Muller Charitable Institutions came in to existence in 1966. It began with an outpatient department and a modest inpatient facility for 25 beds. The postgraduate department of psychiatry with modern facilities came in to existence in 1992. Over the years there have been remarkable progress and the department has developed in to one of the best postgraduate training centers in Karnataka with excellent general hospital and mental hospital facilities for patient care. The clinical service of the department for psychiatric patients includes outpatient service, specialty clinics, emergency clinical service, inpatient service and day care for suitable patients. Our Special Clinics include Geriatric Clinic (Neuropsychiatry clinic for elderly, Memory clinic, Clinic for senile disorder), Psychomotor Clinic, Bipolar Clinic, Deaddiction Clinic and Child Psychiatry Clinic. The staff and postgraduates of the department regularly attend multiple extension services. The inpatient facilities include General and Family Psychiatry wards. The center has excellent modern facilities for patients as well as for the nursing staff, the paramedical staff and the doctors. The department of psychiatry has highly qualified consultants with immense clinical, teaching and research experience. We have excellent facilities for outpatient, inpatient and day care of psychiatric patients. The department of psychiatry is an excellent facility of great reputation located within a multispecialty general hospital of a medical college. De-addiction centre: The De-addiction Center of Father Muller Medical College Hospital was established with the aim of providing quality treatment to individuals abusing alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs. Since its inception in 1992, the Center has been providing clinical services, follow up and community outreach services. Rehabilitation Centre: The rehabilitation center became functional in the year 1965. This was mainly started as anoccupational therapy for the patients disfigured by leprosy. The Rehabilitation unit provides them workwith soft and smooth materials, causing no damage to them. This therapy really helps them to regain their sense of achievement and confidence. The Rehabilitation unit produces beautiful block printed bed spreads and silk shawls, lovely wall hangings, scarves and greeting cards with batic work on them and exquisitely prepared toys. A printing press is also a part of the Rehabilitation unit. The people working here spend their time making letter heads, invitations, envelopes and other material that are required in the Hospital.
